Christine,

Does the following definition adequately cover erosion within an entire buffer? The eventual goal is to allow the protection of property by allowing stabilization of eroding land, no matter where in the buffer erosion is occurring. A revetment at the water/land interface is typical but we also have seen where the water/land interface is not eroding, but erosion is occurring landward (I attached a little drawing). This definition is the first step in our quest to allow more types of shoreline stabilization. Please call me if you have questions.

Erosion means the wearing away of land, including shoreline and sideslopes, through natural or artificial causes the wearing away of a shoreline or side slopes through the operation of currents, boat wakes, tides or the natural activity of rainfall. Gradual erosion means the slow wearing away of land due to natural and/or artificial causes. Accelerated erosion means the rapid or catastrophic loss of land due to natural and/or artificial causes.
